LORDS REFORM: End of the line for hereditary peers

HE 600-year-old right of hereditary peers to make the United Kingdom's laws ended vesterday with a whimper. rather than a bang. Apart from the antics of the heir to a dukedom resulting from Charles II's liaison with Nell Gwynn, Britain's peerage left the parliamentary stage quietly, with only 81 votes recorded against the most significant constitutional change this century.

It was a fitting, low-key conclusion to a tradition that has long outlived its usefulness. The 21st century is dawning, and the privileges handed out for good and bad reasons to favourites of kings, queens and governments down the years have no place in today's world. Everyone has a right to their opinion and no doubt many hereditary peers will continue to speak out but in an age of equality no one should have a special place by virtue of birth

Tony Blair has achieved a fundamental reform, by virtue of his huge majority, that has defied the wishes of previous prime ministers dating back to Liberal attempts in 1911. But the removal of the unqualified rights of hereditary peers is only the first stage of his revolution. To minimise the opposition from hordes of dukes, earls and viscounts, he struck a deal with the Tories that ensured that 92 of their number would be chosen — by themselves to continue sitting until a new upper house is devised.

It could be described as an Irish solution to a British problem, which will leave the Lords represented, at least until after the next election, by a mix of life peers and a small but active band of hereditaries, mostly nominated and elected by the political parties.

There is a place in practically every developed nation for an upper chamber, where citizens with an expertise gained either in politics, business trade unions or other walks of life have a chance to monitor legislation from the elected chamber.

Not just the Houses of Parliament, but the whole structure of the nation itself is undergoing a quiet transformation, not before time. Other countries throughout Europe have developed regional institutions, bringing government closer to the people, and this has been Mr Blair's vision. Devolution for Scotland and Wales will necessitate another look at representation in the Commons, as well as in the successor to the Lords, and Northern Ireland must not

be left behind.


At present Northern Ireland is represented by hereditary peers, both interested and disinterested, plus a selection of mostly political appointments, as former politicians or political activists. Almost anything would be better, with a working Assembly, hopefully, nominating its own choices.

FIRST of all it should be emphasised that as far as the people of Northern Ireland are concerned failure is not an option.

BUT the people of Northern Ireland never like to get their hopes up too much. When asked 'Do you think the review of the Belfast Agreement will be successful?' only 44% said Yes.

The most optimistic were the Alliance voters at 72% followed by the SDLP at 63% then Sinn Fein and the UUP both at 45%, PUP at 41% and DUP at 21%. The people of Northern Ireland are notoriously sceptical about peace processes, they have every reason to be.

Yet 85% of them want the Mitchell Review to be the second exception to prove that rule. But how?


